You are encouraged to participate fully from home—sing the hymns heartily, speak the prayers intentionally, and engage physically by sitting and standing as a form of "body prayer."

THE SERVICE OF LIGHT

The liturgy begins in darkness.

LIGHTING & BLESSING OF THE NEW FIRE


In the darkness, the Bishop kindles a new fire. All stand, as able.

On behalf of the Church, the Bishop invites the Assembly to gather in vigil. Incence is offered, and the Bishop then asks God to sanctify the new fire.

INSCRIPTION & LIGHTING OF THE PASCHAL CANDLE

The Bishop prepares the Paschal Candle by tracing a cross on it.

The Paschal Candle is then lighted from the newly-kindled fire, and the Deacon carries the candle through the Assembly. The procession pauses three times to elevate the candle and sing:



Assembly Thanks be to God.

All light their candles from the Paschal Candle, sharing the light of Christ with one another. (Holding candles as upright as possible will allow them to burn longer, and minimize dripping.) The Paschal Candle is placed in its stand, and a Cantor sings the Exsultet, the Church's ancient proclamation of Easter.

Cantor Rejoice now, heavenly hosts and choirs of angels, and let your trumpets shout Salvation for the victory of our mighty King.

Rejoice and be glad now, Mother Church, and let your holy courts, in radiant light, resound with the praises of your people.



that to redeem a slave, you gave a Son.


How holy is this night, when wickedness is put to ight, and sin is washed away. It restores innocence to the fallen, and joy to those who mourn.



RITES OF BAPTISM, CONFIRMATION & RECEPTION

Holy Baptism is full initiation by water and Holy Spirit into Christ's Body the Church. The bond which God establishes in Baptism is indissoluble. Confirmation is the rite in which we express a mature commitment to Christ by a solemn, public reaffirmation of our Baptismal promises, and receive strength from the Holy Spirit through prayer and the laying on of hands by a bishop. The rite of Reception is similar, for those Baptized adults coming to the Episcopal Church from another Christian communion.



THANKSGIVING OVER THE WATER




Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give God thanks and praise.

Bishop We thank you, Almighty God, for the gi of water. Over it the Holy Spirit moved in the beginning of creation. rough it you led the children of Israel out of their bondage in Egypt into the land of promise. In it your Son Jesus received the baptism of John and was anointed by the Holy Spirit as the Messiah, the Christ, to lead us, through his death and resurrection, from the bondage of sin into everlasting life.

We thank you, Father, for the water of Baptism. In it we are buried with Christ in his death. By it we share in his resurrection. rough it we are reborn by the Holy Spirit. erefore in joyful obedience to your Son, we bring into his fellowship those who come to him in faith, baptizing them in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Now sanctify this water, we pray you, by the power of your Holy Spirit, $[\times 3]$ that those who here are cleansed from sin and born again may continue for ever in the risen life of Jesus Christ our Savior. To him, to you, and to the Holy Spirit, be all honor and glory, now and for ever.

THE BAPTISMS

Each candidate is baptized in the Name of the Trinity.

The Assembly responds: Amen.

Then each is sealed with chrism, oil blessed by the Bishop during Holy Week for use at Baptism. The Assembly responds: **Amen.**

Candles lit from the Paschal Candle are given to the newly baptized as a symbol of our Baptismal Ministry to carry the light of Christ into the world.

When these actions have been completed for all candidates, the Presider prays over the newly baptized.

The Assembly responds: Amen.

Confess the faith of Christ crucified,

and share with us in his eternal priesthood.

The sponsors return to their seats.

BAPTISMAL SPRINKLING

The Assembly is sprinkled with baptismal water as a sign and reminder of our Baptism.

EPISTLE Romans 6:3–11

Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? erefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his. We know that our old self was cruci ed with him so that the body of sin might be destroyed, and we might no longer be enslaved to sin. For whoever has died is freed from sin. But if we have died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him. e death he died, he died to sin, once for all; but the life he lives, he lives to God. So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus.

When the sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices, so that they might go and anoint Jesus. When they looked up, they saw that the stone, which was very large, had already been rolled back. 






Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give God thanks and praise.

Bishop We acclaim you, holy Lord, glorious in power. Your mighty works reveal your wisdom and love. You formed us in your own image, giving the whole world into our care, so that, in obedience to you, our Creator, we might rule and serve all your creatures. When our disobedience took us far from you, you did not abandon us to the power of death. In your mercy you came to our help, so that in seeking you we might not you. Again and again you called us into covenant with you, and through the prophets you taught us to hope for salvation.

Father, you loved the world so much that in the fullness of time you sent your only Son to be our Savior. Incarnate by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, he lived as one of us, yet without sin. To the poor he proclaimed the good news of salvation; to prisoners, freedom; to the sorrowful, joy. To ful ll your purpose he gave himself up to death; and, rising from the grave, destroyed death, and made the whole creation new.

And, that we might live no longer for ourselves, but for him who died and rose for us, he sent the Holy Spirit, his own rst gi for those who believe, to complete his work in the world, and to bring to ful llment the sanctication of all.

When the hour had come for him to be glori ed by you, his heavenly Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end; at supper with them he took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: is is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

A er supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: is is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Father, we now celebrate this memorial of our redemption. Recalling Christ's death and his descent among the dead, proclaiming his resurrection and ascension to your right hand, awaiting his coming in glory; and o ering to you, from the gi s you have given us, this bread and this cup, we praise you and we bless you.


