ABOUT FRANCIS OF ASSISI

TRANCIS, the son of a prosperous merchant of Assisi, was born in 1182. His early youth was spent in harmless revelry and fruitless attempts to win military glory. Various encounters with beggars and lepers pricked the young man's conscience, however, and he decided to embrace a life devoted to Lady Poverty. Despite his father's intense opposition, Francis totally renounced all material values and devoted himself to serve the poor. In 1210, Pope Innocent III confirmed the simple Rule for the Order of Friars Minor, a name Francis chose to emphasize his desire to be numbered among the "least" of God's servants.

The order grew rapidly all over Europe. But, by 1221, Francis had lost control of it, since his ideal of strict and absolute poverty, both for the individual friars and for the order as a whole, was found to be too difficult to maintain. His last years were spent in much suffering of body and spirit, but his unconquerable joy never failed. In his later years he was ordained as a deacon, but he resisted all efforts to persuade him to become a priest.

Not long before his death, during a retreat on Mount La Verna, Francis received, on September 14, Holy Cross Day, the marks of the Lord's wounds, the stigmata, in his own hands and feet and side. Pope Gregory IX, a former patron of the Franciscans, canonized Francis in 1228 and began the erection of the great basilica in Assisi where Francis is buried.

Of all the saints, Francis is perhaps the most popular and admired but probably the least imitated; few have attained to his total identification with the poverty and suffering of Christ. Francis left few writings; but, of these, his spirit of joyous faith comes through most truly in the "Canticle of the Sun," which he composed at Clare's convent of St. Damian's. The version in The Hymnal begins (The Hymnal 1982, #406; #407):

Most High, omnipotent, good Lord, To thee be ceaseless praise outpoured,— And blessing without measure. Let creatures all give thanks to thee And serve in great humility.

THE PRESENTATIONS

Those who seek ordination to the diaconate are nominated by their own congregation, recommended to the bishop by the diocesan Commission on Ministry, and approved by the Bishop and the Standing Committee of the Diocese.

The bishop and people are seated. For each ordinand in turn:

- *Presenters* Melissa, Bishop in the Church of God, on behalf of the clergy and people of the Diocese of Olympia, we present to you *N*.*N*. to be ordained a deacon in Christ's holy catholic Church.
 - *Bishop* Has she been selected in accordance with the canons of this Church? And do you believe her manner of life to be suitable to the exercise of this ministry?
- *Presenters* We certify to you that she has satisfied the requirements of the canons, and we believe her qualified for this order.
- The Bishop addresses the ordinand:
 - *Bishop* Will you be loyal to the doctrine, discipline, and worship of Christ as this Church has received them? And will you, in accordance with the canons of this Church, obey your bishop and other ministers who may have authority over you and your work?
- Ordinand I am willing and ready to do so; and I solemnly declare that I do believe the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments to be the Word of God, and to contain all things necessary to salvation; and I do solemnly engage to conform to the doctrine, discipline, and worship of the Episcopal Church.

The ordinand and the Bishop then sign the above declaration in the sight of all present.

After all the ordinands have been presented and examined, all stand, as able.

The Bishop addresses the entire Assembly:

Bishop Dear friends in Christ, you know the importance of this ministry, and the weight of your responsibility in presenting Kae Eaton, Lisa Graumlich, and Lynette Poulton for ordination to the sacred order of deacons. Therefore if any of you know any impediment or crime because of which we should not proceed, come forward now, and make it known.

If no objection is made, the Bishop continues:

Bishop Is it your will that Kae, Lisa, and Lynette be ordained deacons?

Assembly It is.

Bishop Will you uphold them in this ministry?

Assembly We will.

Bishop In peace let us pray to the Lord.

For it leaves its eggs to the earth, and lets them be warmed on the ground,


forgetting that a foot may crush them, and that a wild animal may trample them.

It deals cruelly with its young, as if they were not its own; though its labour should be in vain, yet it has no fear;


because God has made it forget wisdom, and given it no share in understanding.


When it spreads its plumes aloft, it laughs at the horse and its rider."

HOMILY

THE BAPTISMAL COVENANT

The bishop reminds the Assembly that the foundation of all ministry is in baptism and invites the entire Assembly, along with the ordinands, to renew their Baptismal Covenant. All stand, as able, and turn to face the baptismal font in the rear of the nave.

The Book of Common Prayer, p. 292 *El Libro de Oración Común*, p. 213

Bishop Do you reaffirm your renunciation of evil and renew your commitment to Jesus Christ? *Assembly* I do.

Bishop Do you believe in God the Father?

Assembly I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

Bishop Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

Assembly I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord. He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again to judge the living and the dead.

Bishop Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?

- Assembly I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting.
 - *Bishop* Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers?
- Assembly I will, with God's help.
 - *Bishop* Will you persevere in resisting evil, and, whenever you fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord?

Assembly I will, with God's help.

Bishop Will you proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ?

Assembly I will, with God's help.

Bishop Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself?

Assembly I will, with God's help.

Bishop Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being?

Assembly I will, with God's help.

Bishop Will you cherish the wondrous works of God, and protect the beauty and integrity of all creation? *Assembly* I will, with God's help.

Presider May Almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has given us a new birth by water and the Holy Spirit, and bestowed upon us the forgiveness of sins, keep us in eternal life by his grace, in Christ Jesus our Lord.

All Amen.

The ordinands and bishop sprinkle the Assembly with water from the font as a sign and reminder of our Baptism.

THE EXAMINATIONS

All are seated, except for the ordinands, who stand before the Bishop. The Bishop addresses the ordinands:

The Book of Common Prayer, p. 543 *El Libro de Oración Común*, p. 445

Bishop My sisters, every Christian is called to follow Jesus Christ, serving God the Father, through the power of the Holy Spirit. God now calls you to a special ministry of servanthood directly under your bishop. In the name of Jesus Christ, you are to serve all people, particularly the poor, the weak, the sick, and the lonely.

As a deacon in the Church, you are to study the Holy Scriptures, to seek nourishment from them, and to model your life upon them. You are to make Christ and his redemptive love known, by your word and example, to those among whom you live, and work, and worship. You are to interpret to the Church the needs, concerns, and hopes of the world. You are to assist the bishop and priests in public worship and in the ministration of God's Word and Sacraments, and you are to carry out other duties assigned to you from time to time. At all times, your life and teaching are to show Christ's people that in serving the helpless they are serving Christ himself.

My sisters, do you believe that you are truly called by God and his Church to the life and work of a deacon?

Ordinands I believe I am so called.

PRAYER OF CONSECRATION

Bishop GOD, most merciful Father, we praise you for sending your Son Jesus Christ, who took on himself the form of a servant, and humbled himself, becoming obedient even to death on the cross. We praise you that you have highly exalted him, and made him Lord of all; and that, through him, we know that whoever would be great must be servant of all. We praise you for the many ministries in your Church, and for calling these your servants to the order of deacons.

Here the Bishop lays hands upon the head of each ordinand, and prays:

Therefore, Father, through Jesus Christ your Son, give your Holy Spirit to *N*.; fill her with grace and power, and make her a deacon in your Church.

The Bishop then continues:

Make them, O Lord, modest and humble, strong and constant, to observe the discipline of Christ. Let their lives and teaching so reflect your commandments, that through them many may come to know you and love you. As your Son came not to be served but to serve, may these deacons share in Christ's service, and come to the unending glory of him who, with you and the Holy Spirit, lives and reigns, one God, for ever and ever.

The Assembly, in a loud voice, responds: Amen.

All are seated. The new deacons are now vested according to the order of deacons.

The Bishop then gives a Bible to the newly ordained, saying:

Receive this Bible as the sign of your authority to proclaim God's Word and to assist in the ministration of his holy Sacraments.



Presider We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me." After Supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

- Presider Therefore, according to his command, O Father,
 - All We remember his death, We proclaim his resurrection, We await his coming in glory;
- *Presider* And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine. We pray you, gracious God, to send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Sacrament of the Body of Christ and his Blood of the new Covenant. Unite us to your Son in his sacrifice, that we may be acceptable through him, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit. 
Presider The Gifts of God for the People of God.



As mental health Chaplain, Kae has years of experience on the streets of Seattle not only working directly with people living without homes and dealing with mental health issues, but also training others in the *Practices of Companionship* through outreach and ministries of hospitality, including organizations like the United Way, the YMCA Landlord Tenant Project, the Deacons from Western Washington and Oregon, and fifty plus congregations from 2010-2023. She has written extensively on Companionship, including as a contributing author to Chaplaincy and Spiritual Care in Mental Health Settings (https://us.jkp.com/products/chaplaincy-and-spiritual-care-in-mental-health-settings).

Kae has also worked locally and nationally with both secular and faith-based communities doing workshops and trainings to support efforts for outreach and companionship to individuals and families experiencing issues with mental health, trauma, homelessness and substance use disorders. D^{R.} LISA GRAUMLICH is a climate scientist whose ministry bridges the worlds of science and faith. After decades of ground-breaking research on the causes and impacts of climate change, Lisa started to question why, in the face of undeniable evidence of climate change, were we so slow to act. She pivoted to devote more and more time to speaking publicly about the impacts of climate change, especially on those most vulnerable and least responsible for global warming. She spoke anywhere she was invited, from church basements to the U.S. Congress. In a Holy Spirit moment, she realized that our biggest challenge had little to do with science but rather was how to connect our deepest spiritual values with our compassion for our neighbors. In our Christian traditions we call this creation care and environmental justice.

Lisa had a vision of what work at the intersection of science and faith might look like based on the ministry of her mother, Deacon Nancy Graumlich. Deacon Nancy was a leader in the peace and justice movement in her home of Toledo, Ohio. Sitting by Nancy's side during her final days, Lisa quietly vowed to learn from Nancy's life to lean into her calling with fierce determination. Lisa is grateful to the clergy and members of Saint Mark's Cathedral who guided her discernment as she considered the diaconate. She is especially grateful to the inspiriting leaders of the Creation Care ministry at Saint Mark's who helped her see that building a bridge between science and ministry was within her reach.

Lisa regards her field placement at Trinity Parish on Seattle's First Hill as another turning point. Under Rector Sabeth Fitzgibbon's guidance and with the encouragement of this deeply committed congregation, Lisa came to understand the role of the deacon more fully. For Lisa, it is now less about capturing the limelight with passionate speeches or stirring calls to action. It's about loving all our neighbors and building the beloved community that will be the key to adapting to the futures we face. •

She has been part of Episcopal communities in multiple countries and continues to appreciate the Episcopal church's deep commitment to both Scripture and social justice.

For twenty-seven years, Lynette served as a commissioned officer in the U.S. Foreign Service, posted in Africa, Latin America, and Europe as well as the United States. Throughout this period, Lynette dedicated herself to conflict resolution and reconciliation on an international level, with a particular focus on multilateral negotiations. Lynette retired in 2017. She moved to Camas, Washington, and joined St. Anne Episcopal Church, Washougal.

Lynette began discernment for the Vocational Deaconate around 2006. After completing the first phase of the discernment process, Lynette redeployed to Russia, putting her formation process on hold. Upon leaving the Foreign Service, Lynette reentered discernment, this time in the Diocese of Olympia. She is currently worshiping and serving at St. Luke/San Lucas Episcopal Church, Vancouver.

As a Deacon, Lynette looks forward to continuing her efforts at conflict resolution, peacebuilding, and reconciliation, now working at the community level.
