



INVITATION TO COMMUNION

All may be seated for the time of Communion. All seeking God are welcome at Christ's Table.

Please follow the directions of the Liturgical Ministers. Bread and wine are distributed at standing stations at the head of three aisles. The bread will placed into your outstretched palm. If you prefer a gluten-free wafer, simply ask for one at the time of Communion. If you wish to receive a blessing instead, please cross your arms in front of your chest.

Intinction (dipping the bread in the wine) is not available at this time. If you do not wish to drink from the common cup, please cross your arms in front of your chest as you pass by the chalice. The full grace of the sacrament is received with only the bread.

The Rev. Canon Jerry Moritsune Shigaki

October 21, 1946 – October 5, 2023 MAY HE REST IN PEACE.

The Rev. Canon Jerry Moritsune Shigaki was born on October 21, 1946, in Seattle, Washington. He was a third-generation Japanese American. The youngest of four children, he was born after the family's incarceration during WWII, in Minidoka, Idaho. He earned a BA in personnel management and business administration with a comprehensive study in sociology from the University of Washington in 1968. After graduation, he served as a caseworker for the Department of Social & Health Services in Seattle before returning to school to earn a Master of Social Work with an emphasis in human services from the University of Washington in 1975. In the mid-70s, he worked with the Southeast Asian refugee resettlement program, assisting mostly Vietnamese families to acclimate and settle into their new lives in Seattle.

After earning his master's degree, he continued his work both professionally and personally, centered around service to others. This included: continuing his role as a caseworker within DSHS, serving in the University of Washington's Equal Opportunity Program that assisted minority applicants in gaining admission to the University, working with the Center for Career Alternatives helping disadvantaged youth and adults to gain education and employment, supporting and coaching youth development in local basketball leagues, serving as an active member and past president of the Japanese American Citizens League, serving as one of the founding members of the Asian Counseling and Referral Services, and teaching English as a second language through various organizations (Seattle Central Community College and most recently, with EZ Language Club for Native Japanese Speakers).

With the encouragement of The Rev. Timothy Nakayama, Jerry went on a mission trip to Rome in 1989, where he was a Social Worker/Missioner for the Joel Nafuma Refugee Center, working with refugees from Africa, Eastern Europe, and the Soviet Union. After this experience, Jerry began to discern a call to ordained ministry. He graduated with an M.Div. from Seabury-Western Theological Seminary on June 2, 2000, ordained to the transitional deaconate on June 24, 2000, and was ordained to the priesthood on January 13, 2001.

Beginning in 2000, Jerry served as the Missioner for Ethnic Ministries for the Diocese of Olympia. In this position, Jerry coordinated and supported the development of ethnic and multi-cultural congregations, as well as facilitated meetings with people of color seeking Holy Orders or pursuing lay leadership positions. From 2005-2010, he worked closely with The Rt. Rev. Bavi Edna "Nedi" Rivera and others to strengthen diversity in the diocese. He also provided anti-racism training to congregations and governing bodies within the Diocese. He was an integral part of the Anti-Racism Task Force in 2007 and was part of the Hurricane Katrina Response Group. Finally, Jerry, along with The Rev. Rachel Taber-Hamilton, was integral in the formation of The Circles of Color, a structure within the Diocese of Olympia, by which the perspectives and voices of people of color are magnified.

Through the years of his ministry, Jerry also served as a supply priest at many congregations. Among these were: Faith Episcopal Church, Poulsbo; St. Clare's, Snoqualmie; Church of the Holy Apostles, Bellevue; and Holy Family of Jesus, Tacoma (Diocese of Olympia); at St Peter's by the Sea (Diocese of Alaska); at St. Paul's and St. John's Episcopal Churches of West Kauai (Diocese of Hawaii); and at the Cheyenne River Episcopal Mission in Eagle Butte (Diocese of South Dakota).

Jerry's lifelong work as a social worker and a priest revolved around social justice. He worked towards increasing opportunities for those less advantaged, celebrated diversity, and always strove and advocated for a more inclusive, just, and equitable society. His legacy will live on in the diverse communities where he worked with love, devotion, and passion for social change.

Jerry was preceded in death by his brother, Dale, and is survived by his daughter Christine (husband Kyle); grandsons Kelan and Corey; sister-in-law Karen; siblings Irene and John (wife Polly); and many nephews and nieces.
