Saint Mark's Cathedral acknowledges that we gather on the traditional land of the first people of Seattle, the Duwamish People, who are still here, and we honor with gratitude the land itself and the life of all the Coast Salish tribes.

Before the liturgy begins, while the cathedral is in darkness, in consideration of those around you please maintain silence and refrain from all mobile phone use as much as possible.

THE LIGHTING OF THE PASCHAL CANDLE

The Assembly gathers in silence in the darkened cathedral.

LIGHTING & BLESSING OF THE NEW FIRE

In the darkness, the Bishop kindles a new fire.

All stand, as able.

On behalf of the Church, the Bishop invites the Assembly to gather in vigil. Incense is offered, and the Bishop then asks God to sanctify the new fire.

LIGHTING & PROCESSION OF THE PASCHAL CANDLE

The Bishop prepares the Paschal Candle by tracing a cross and piercing it with nails. The Paschal Candle is then lighted from the newly-kindled fire, and the Deacon carries the candle through the Assembly. The procession pauses three times to elevate the candle and sing:



Cantor The light of Christ.



Assembly Thanks be to God.

All light their candles from the Paschal Candle, sharing the light of Christ with one another. (Holding candles as upright as possible will allow them to burn longer, and minimize dripping.) The Paschal Candle is placed in its stand, the deacon censes it, and a Cantor sings the Exsultet, the Church's ancient proclamation of Easter.

Cantor Rejoice now, heavenly hosts and choirs of angels, and let your trumpets shout Salvation

for the victory of our mighty King.

Rejoice and sing now, all the round earth,

bright with a glorious splendor,


for darkness has been vanquished by our eternal King.

All you who stand near this marvelous and holy flame,

pray with me to God the Almighty for the grace to sing the worthy praise of this great light; through Jesus Christ his Son our Lord, who lives and reigns with him,

in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever.



Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give God thanks and praise.

Cantor It is truly right and good, always and everywhere, with our whole heart and mind and voice, to praise you, the invisible, almighty, and eternal God, and your onlybegotten Son, Jesus Christ our Lord; for he is the true Paschal Lamb, who at the feast of the Passover paid for us the debt of Adam's sin, and by his blood delivered your faithful people.

This is the night, when you brought our forebears, the children of Israel, out of bondage in Egypt, and led them through the Red Sea on dry land.

This is the night, when all who believe in Christ are delivered from the gloom of sin, and are restored to grace and holiness of life.

This is the night, when Christ broke the bonds of death and hell, and rose victorious from the grave.

How wonderful and beyond our knowing, O God, is your mercy and lovingkindness to us, that to redeem a slave, you gave a Son.

How holy is this night, when wickedness is put to flight, and sin is washed away. It restores innocence to the fallen, and joy to those who mourn. It casts out pride and hatred, and brings peace and concord.

How blessed is this night, when earth and heaven are joined and humanity is reconciled to God.

Holy Father, accept our evening sacrifice, the offering of this candle in your honor. May it shine continually to drive away all darkness. May Christ, the Morning Star who knows no setting, find it ever burning—he who gives his light to all creation, and who lives and reigns for ever and ever.







HOLY BAPTISM

Holy Baptism is full initiation by water and Holy Spirit into Christ's Body the Church. The bond which God establishes in Baptism is indissoluble.

Those preparing for Confirmation, Reception into The Episcopal Church, or Reaffirmation of their Baptismal Vows are also blessed at this service. Confirmation, Reception, and Reaffirmation will take place here in the cathedral nave on Cathedral Day.

PRESENTATION & EXAMINATION OF THE CANDIDATES

The Book of Common Prayer, p. 301

The candidates for Baptism are formally presented.

The Bishop questions them as to their readiness and desire to receive the sacrament.

Then the candidates for Confirmation, Reception, and Reaffirmation of their Baptismal Vows are formally presented for enrollment. The Bishop asks God's blessing on the candidates.

All stand, as able, when the Presider addresses the Assembly.

Bishop Will you who witness these vows do all in your power to support these persons in their life in Christ?

Assembly We will.

THE RENEWAL OF BAPTISMAL VOWS

The Bishop invites all to renew the vows made (or made on their behalf) at their Baptism.

Bishop Do you believe in God the Father?

Assembly I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

Bishop Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

Assembly I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord.

He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary.

He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried.

He descended to the dead.

On the third day he rose again.

He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again to judge the living and the dead.

Bishop Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?

the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins,

the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting.





The candidates, sponsors, and ministers process back to the baptismal font, located at the entrance to the nave. Everyone is invited to leave their seats and gather around the font in order to have a better view of the Baptisms.

THANKSGIVING OVER THE WATER





Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give God thanks and praise.

The Bishop thanks God for the gift of water, and for the waters of Baptism.

As she plunges the Paschal Candle into the water three times, she prays:

Bishop Now sanctify this water, we pray you, by the power of your Holy Spirit, [×3] that those who here are cleansed from sin and born again may continue for ever in the risen life of Jesus Christ our Savior. To him, to you, and to the Holy Spirit, be all honor and glory, now and for ever.

Assembly A - men.

THE BAPTISMS

Each candidate is baptized in the Name of the Trinity.

The Assembly responds: Amen.

Then each is sealed with chrism, oil blessed by the Bishop during Holy Week for use at Baptism.

The Assembly responds: Amen.

Candles lit from the Paschal Candle are given to the newly baptized, as a symbol of our Baptismal Ministry to carry the light of Christ into the world.

When these actions have been completed for all candidates, the Bishop prays over the newly baptized. The Assembly responds: **Amen.**

WELCOME

Bishop Let us welcome the newly baptized.

Assembly We receive you into the household of God.

Confess the faith of Christ crucified, proclaim his resurrection, and share with us in his eternal priesthood.

BAPTISMAL SPRINKLING

The Assembly is sprinkled with baptismal water as a sign and reminder of our Baptism.

The cathedral is illuminated. All extinguish their candles. The altar is vested in its festal paraments.

All ring bells throughout the singing of the following Canticle, Gloria in excelsis.



Bishop The Lord be with you.

Assembly And also with you.

Bishop Let us pray.

God, who made this most holy night to shine with the glory of the Lord's resurrection: Stir up in your Church that Spirit of adoption which is given to us in Baptism, that we, being renewed both in body and mind, may worship you in sincerity and truth; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Please be seated for the reading of the Epistle.

EPISTLE Romans 6:3-11

Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his. We know that our old self was crucified with him so that the body of sin might be destroyed, and we might no longer be enslaved to sin. For whoever has died is freed from sin. But if we have died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him. The death he died, he died to sin, once for all; but the life he lives, he lives to God. So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus.

Reader Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people.

Assembly Thanks be to God.

The cantor sings the Alleluia three times on successively higher pitches. The Assembly repeats the Alleluia each time.



THE HOLY GOSPEL Matthew 28:1-10

Deacon The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew. *Assembly* Glory to you, Lord Christ.

A FTER THE SABBATH, as the first day of the week was dawning, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to see the tomb. And suddenly there was a great earthquake; for an angel of the Lord, descending from heaven, came and rolled back the stone and sat on it. His appearance was like lightning, and his clothing white as snow. For fear of him the guards shook and became like dead men. But the angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid; I know that you are looking for Jesus who was crucified. He is not here; for he has been raised, as he said. Come, see the place where he lay. Then go quickly and tell his disciples, 'He has been raised from the dead, and indeed he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him.' This is my message for you." So they left the tomb quickly with fear and great joy, and ran to tell his disciples. Suddenly Jesus met them and said, "Greetings!" And they came to him, took hold of his feet, and worshiped him. Then Jesus said to them, "Do not be afraid; go and tell my brothers to go to Galilee; there they will see me."





When our disobedience took us far from you, you did not abandon us to the power of death. In your mercy you came to our help, so that in seeking you we

might find you. Again and again you called us into covenant with you, and through the prophets you taught us to hope for salvation.

Father, you loved the world so much that in the fullness of time you sent your only Son to be our Savior. Incarnate by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, he lived as one of us, yet without sin. To the poor he proclaimed the good news of salvation; to prisoners, freedom; to the sorrowful, joy. To fulfill your purpose he gave himself up to death; and, rising from the grave, destroyed death, and made the whole creation new.

And, that we might live no longer for ourselves, but for him who died and rose for us, he sent the Holy Spirit, his own first gift for those who believe, to complete his work in the world, and to bring to fulfillment the sanctification of all.

When the hour had come for him to be glorified by you, his heavenly Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end; at supper with them he took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Father, we now celebrate this memorial of our redemption. Recalling Christ's death and his descent among the dead, proclaiming his resurrection and ascension to your right hand, awaiting his coming in glory; and offering to you, from the gifts you have given us, this bread and this cup, we praise you and we bless you.

and we pray to you, Lord our God.



Please follow the directions of the Liturgical Ministers. Bread and wine are distributed at standing stations at the head of three aisles. The bread will placed into your outstretched palm taking care not to touch your hand. If you prefer a gluten-free wafer, simply ask for one at the time of Communion. If you wish to receive a blessing instead, please cross your arms in front of your chest.

Intinction (dipping the bread in the wine) is not available at this time. If you do not wish to drink from the common cup, please cross your arms in front of your chest as you pass by the chalice. The full grace of the sacrament is received with only the bread.




