HAPPY from now on are those who die in the Lord! So it is, says the Spirit, for they rest from their labors.



DEREK STEPHEN DOHN

April 28, 1966 - April 20, 2023

Derek Dohn, 56, passed away peacefully surrounded by loved ones on Thursday, April 20, 2023 in Seattle, Washington after an almost three-year battle with stage IV kidney cancer.

Derek was born in Yakima, Washington to G. Thomas Dohn and Nancy Moore (Barrett) on April 28, 1966. Derek grew up in Yakima on an orchard, and was happiest on a ski slope, on a ski behind a boat, or spending time with the many pets that he cherished. He graduated from West Valley High School in 1984.

Derek had a life-long quest for knowledge and understanding. He graduated from University of Washington with an undergraduate degree in Business, followed by Princeton Theological Seminary in Princeton, New Jersey, where he earned both a Masters of Divinity and a Masters of Philosophy. After attending Seminary, Derek attended Duke University School of Law in Durham, North Carolina, where he obtained his Juris Doctorate (JD), with additional legal studies from the University of Copenhagen and the University of Hong Kong.

Derek was an entrepreneur to his core. In his twenties, he established a successful e-Discovery/software firm, Chameleon DATA, which led to a series of additional ventures. He relished challenging the status quo and thinking "outside the box." There was no problem he wouldn't tackle or try to solve. He loved a great challenge!

Derek was a man of immense adventure and cherished life to its fullest. As a young man, he set off to Alaska after high school where he camped on the beach and worked in the canneries. He traveled the world many times over – generally with little to no itinerary to see where life would take him. He developed lifelong friends along the way, and immersed himself in different cultures and foods. He wasn't afraid to try new things, including skydiving, ziplining, Icelandic pony riding, and, later in life, moving to five different cities with his life partner over the course of 10 years.

Derek also had a deep reverence and appreciation for all things living. He loved all creatures great and small, especially his shelties later in life, Nemo and Gracie. He would do anything to provide someone a sense of community and genuine friendship regardless of life situation, pedigree, or prowess.

His many passions included skiing, racquetball, carpentry, water skiing, eating, photography, music, landscaping, and travel. Derek also was a gifted and prolific writer with a deep appreciation of literature. He especially adored the writings of C.S. Lewis. He was incredibly passionate about serving those around him. He volunteered regularly in multiple capacities from the urban neighborhoods in Philly, Mission trips to Mexico, Pro Bono legal work, and working in a camp for families with children who had cancer.

Above all, Derek was a loyal and committed man who would do anything for those he loved. His love, kindness, and dedication will forever be reflected by those who were privileged to be a part of his life.

Derek is survived by his life partner Kim Hoppner, mother Nancy Barrett, sister Katrina Dohn, step-sisters and brothers Kari Dohn Decker (John), Kristin Ballew (Don), Karen Gamache (Larry), Vicki Hopkins, Dave Barrett (Sue), and Mark Barrett (Cheryl), Todd Lundgren (Eileen Vickery), Rick Lundgren, Paul Lundgren, Kyle Lundgren (Kayla), Reid Lundgren (Ashley), and his step-mother Mardi Hackett.
