Saint Mark's Cathedral acknowledges that we gather on the traditional land of the first people of Seattle, the Duwamish People, who are still here, and we honor with gratitude the land itself and the life of all Coast Salish tribes.

About Zita of Tuscany

Our Cathedral Day liturgy this year observes the commemoration of Zita of Tuscany, a worker of charity.

Zita was born in the early thirteenth century in the village of Montsegradi in Tuscany; she died on April 12, 1271. Zita was born into a poor family, but one in which the Christian faith was emphasized. One of her uncles was a hermit, a sister became a nun, and the entire family was faithful in worship together, both at church and in their home.

At the age of twelve she entered the service of the Fatinelli family in Lucca. Although little more than a child, she maintained the serious faith that she had been taught by her family. Scrupulous in the exercise of her domestic duties, she embodied Paul's advice in Colossians 3:23,

"Whatever your task, put yourselves into it, as done for the Lord and not for your masters."

Her earnest diligence, however, was first met with scorn from both her employers and her fellow servants. Nevertheless, she continued faithfully in her work and exhibited a peace that surpassed comprehension. Through her perseverance in doing good, she eventually earned the respect and affection of the whole household.



In due course, the once despised servant became the housekeeper. As head of the household staff, Zita demonstrated such Christlike benevolence that she came to be venerated throughout Lucca even before her death. Mindful of the poverty in which she had been raised, she gave away most of her income to those in need.

After her death, the popularity of her cult spread as far as England, where she is called Sitha; images of her may be found in churches throughout southern England. In popular piety, she is often entreated in order to find lost keys.





CONFIRMATION, RECEPTION, & REAFFIRMATION

Confirmation is the rite in which we express a mature commitment to Christ by a solemn, public reaffirmation of our Baptismal promises, and receive strength from the Holy Spirit through prayer and the laying on of hands by a bishop. The rite of Reception is similar, for those Baptized adults coming to the Episcopal Church from another Christian communion. For a variety of reasons, people may discover a need several times in their life to publicly reaffirm the meaning of their Baptism, in the presence of the Bishop and with laying on of hands—such Reaffirmations will also occur today.

PRESENTATION & EXAMINATION OF THE CANDIDATES

The Book of Common Prayer (1979), p. 415

Each parish formally presents its candidates for Confirmation, Reception into the Episcopal Church, and Reaffirmation of Baptismal Vows to the Bishop. The Assembly remains seated during the presentations.

After all the candidates have been presented, the Bishop asks the candidates:

Bishop Do you reaffirm your renunciation of evil?

Candidates I do.

Bishop Do you renew your commitment to Jesus Christ?

Candidates I do, and with God's grace I will follow him as my Savior and Lord.

All stand, as able. The Bishop addresses the entire Assembly:

Bishop Will you who witness these vows do all in your power to support these people in their life in Christ? *Assembly* We will.

Bishop Let us join with those who are committing themselves to Christ and renew our own Baptismal Covenant.

The Bishop moves to the Baptismal Font. As this happens, one representative from each congregation is invited to come forward and add a portion of their baptismal water and/or water from their watershed to the font.

The Bishop then adds water from the Jordan River to the font. It is an ancient custom for Christian communities to include water from the Jordan River, and today we continue that tradition by adding such water as a reminder of our connections to Jesus's baptism in the Jordan.

If you have a particular connection with one of the candidates, you are welcome to join them as they approach the Bishop and join in the prayer.


MUSIC DURING THE LAYING ON OF HANDS

Presider We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. Through Mary's Holy Child, you have delivered us from evil and made us worthy to stand before you. You have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, Jesus * took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me." After supper, Jesus took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore, according to his command, O God,

- All We remember his death, We proclaim his resurrection, We await his coming in glory;
- *Presider* And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, Dear One; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine. We pray you, gracious God, to send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Sacrament of the Body of Christ and his Blood of the new Covenant. Unite us to your Son in his sacrifice, that we may be acceptable through him, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit. In the fullness of time, gather all things into the circle of Christ's love, and bring us to that heavenly country where with Mary, Mark, Zita, and all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of all your children; through Jesus Christ, * the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.

Please follow the directions of the Liturgical Ministers. Bread and wine are distributed at standing stations at the head of three aisles. The bread will placed into your outstretched palm. If you prefer a gluten-free wafer, simply ask for one at the time of Communion. If you wish to receive a blessing instead, please cross your arms in front of your chest.

Intinction (dipping the bread in the wine) is not available at this time. If you do not wish to drink from the common cup, please cross your arms in front of your chest as you pass by the chalice. The full grace of the sacrament is received with only the bread.




