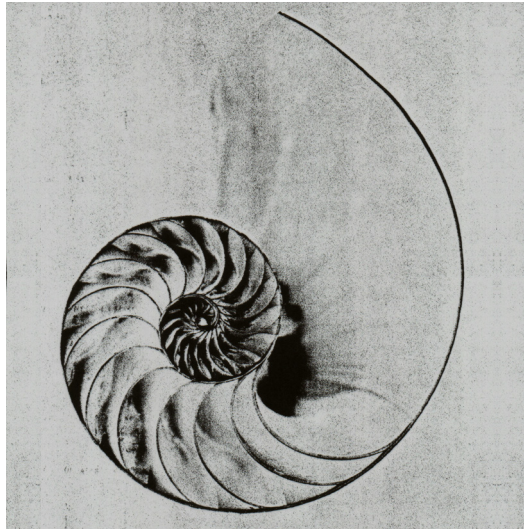

A Liturgy of the Night from the Corrymeela Community

Leader On the first evening God said: “Let there be darkness.” And God separated light from dark; and in the dark, the land rested, the people slept, the plants breathed, and the world retreated. The first night.

All And God said that it was Good.

And on the second night God said: “There will be conversations that happen in the dark that can’t happen in the day.” The second night.

And God said that it was Good.

And on the third night, God said: “Let there be things that can only be seen by night.” And God created stars and insects and luminescence. The third night.

And God said that it was Good.

And on the fourth night, God said: “Some things that happen in the harsh of day will be troubled. Let there be a time of rest to escape the raw light.” The fourth night.

And God said that it was Good.

And on the fifth night, God said: “There will be people who work by night, whose light will be silver, whose sleep will be by day and whose labor will be late.” And God put a softness at the heart of the darkness. The fifth night.

And God said that it was Good.

And on the sixth night, God listened. And there were people working, and people crying, and people seeking shadow, and people telling secrets and people aching for company. There were people aching for space and people aching for solace. And God hoped that they’d survive. And God made twilight, and shafts of green to hang from the dark skies, small comforts to accompany the lonely, the joyous, the needy and the needed. The sixth night.

my bright evening star.

CONFESSION

We repent the wrongs we have done:

Silence

We have wounded your love.
O God, heal us.

We stumble in the darkness.
Light of the world transfigure us.

We forget that we are your home.
Spirit of God, dwell in us.

Eternal Spirit, living God,
in whom we live and move and have our being,
all that we are, have been, and shall be is known to you,
to the very secret of our hearts
and all that rises to trouble us.

Be merciful as your father is merciful. Judge not and you will not be judged. Condemn not and you will not be condemned. Forgive and you will be forgiven.

SONG OF SIMEON (NUNC DIMITTIS)

**Praise be to God, I have lived to see this day.
God's promise is fulfilled, and my duty done.**

**At last you have given me peace,
for I have seen with my own eyes
the salvation you have prepared for all nations—
a light to the world in its darkness,
and the glory of your people Israel.**

**Glory be to God, sustaining, redeeming, sanctifying,
as in the beginning, so now, and for ever.**

Amen.

The antiphon is repeated.

Lord, have mercy. Kyrie eleison.
Christ, have mercy. Christe eleison.
Lord have mercy. Kyrie eleison.

The Lord's Prayer or the alternative is said.

**Our Father in heaven,
hallowed be your name,
your kingdom come,
your will be done,
on earth as in heaven.
Give us today our daily bread.
Forgive us our sins
as we forgive those who sin against us.
Save us from the time of trial
and deliver us from evil.
For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours
now and for ever. Amen.**

Or

**Eternal Spirit,
Earth-maker, Pain-bearer, Life-giver,
Source of all that is and that shall be,
Father and Mother of us all,
Loving God, in whom is heaven:
The hallowing of your name echo through the universe!
The way of your justice be followed by the peoples of the world!
Your heavenly will be done by all created beings!
Your commonwealth of peace and freedom
sustain our hope and come on earth.
With the bread we need for today, feed us.
In the hurts we absorb from one another, forgive us.
In times of temptation and test, strengthen us.
From trials too great to endure, spare us.
From the grip of all that is evil, free us.

rest in you.
The night is quiet.
Let the quietness of your peace enfold us,
all dear to us,
and all who have no peace.

The night heralds the dawn.
Let us look expectantly to a new day,
new joys,
new possibilities.

who loved us first and gave this world to be our home,
to God the Redeemer,
who loves us and by dying and rising
pioneered the way of freedom,
to God the Sanctifier,
who spreads the divine love in our hearts,
be praise and glory for time and for eternity.

- 4** O God,
strengthen your servants with your heavenly grace,
that we may continue yours for ever,
and daily increase in your Holy Spirit more and more,
until we come to your everlasting kingdom.

- 5** Christ be within us to keep us,
beside us to guard,
before us to lead,
behind us to protect,
beneath us to support,
above us to bless.

6 The blessing of God, the eternal goodwill of God,
the shalom of God, the wildness and the warmth of God,
be among us and between us, now and always.

7 Blessing, light, and glory surround us
and scatter the darkness of the long and lonely night.
