MUTUAL MINISTRY PRIORITIES

Each year, the Vestry adopts Mutual Ministry Goals to guide the work of Saint Mark's Cathedral. These goals draw on the cathedral's Strategic Plan, the *Statement of Lament and Commitment to Action*, and the needs discerned in the life of the community. They set shared priorities for the year ahead, focusing the energy of clergy, staff, and parishioners on key areas of growth and service. While the goals themselves change from year to year, we continue to share ideas and collaborate across ministry groups around the priorities of restorative justice, intergenerational ministry and creation care.

RESTORATIVE JUSTICE COUNCIL

The work of the Restorative Justice Council is formed out of a prayerful reflection of Saint Mark's *Statement of Lament and Commitment to Action*. The Council supports specific justice ministry programs but also seeks to nurture a culture in the Parish where all are encouraged and equipped to live out the call to do justice, love mercy and walk humbly with God. Guided by a commitment to be in relationship with rather than simply supply needs for, we seek to heal what is broken, restore what is lost, and foster the possibility of transformation for those we serve and ourselves as well.

CATHEDRAL SUPPORT

From caring for the campus and balancing the books to welcoming newcomers and offering pastoral support, these ministries embody quiet faithfulness. Their work may not always be visible, but it is essential—creating the stability that allows the whole cathedral community to grow and thrive.

VESTRY

The Vestry oversees and stewards the cathedral’s finances, facilities and grounds. Membership is comprised of the Dean, the Bishop

of the Diocese of Olympia, elected lay parishioners, and Diocesan members who serve from other parishes. Together, they strive to model faithful leadership to prayerfully respond and connect to the ministries of the cathedral community. Elected lay members serve three-year terms. Wardens work alongside the Dean to provide leadership to the Vestry and parish.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

The purpose of the Finance Committee is to provide support, advice, and guidance that assists the Vestry in maintaining effective administration of the accounting and financial operations of the Cathedral. The committee monitors and maintains accounting systems to assure the Vestry and the Parish that the funds and designated gifts, collected and disbursed, are appropriate and in accordance with the policies of the Vestry, standard accounting practices, and gift restrictions. STEWARDSHIP MINISTRY

The Stewardship Ministry seeks to foster a countercultural view of giving—all we have been given is from God, and we hold it lightly and with consideration of our neighbor. Gratitude is a central focus of the ministry and is celebrated through continuously showcasing the many contributions of time, talent, and treasure of our generous and faithful stewards. Our goal is for each member of the community to develop a spiritual practice of stewardship on a daily basis.

In addition, the Stewardship Ministry Committee plans and implements the annual fall Commitment Campaign by adopting a supporting theme, developing written materials and visual displays expressive of that theme, and selecting speakers to share with the parish what they are grateful for and what motivates them to generous giving. Helpful skills include knowledge of and interaction with fellow parishioners; ability to take minutes, write simple gratitude exercises, and coordinate with staff on audio-visual displays and communications.

CATHEDRAL COMMONS

Saint Mark’s offers a variety of formation opportunities on Wednesday evenings. These offerings are known as *Cathedral Commons*, since they provide a space in which the cathedral community can come together to share, learn, and grow. The evening begins with Evening Prayer in the nave at 5:30 p.m., followed by a Community Dinner served in Bloedel Hall, 6–6:30 p.m. (\$6/child; \$8/adult; \$25/max. family) A presentation or forum then frequently follows the Wednesday dinner, 6:45 to 8:15 p.m. Many of these offerings are hybrid, offered both to those gathered in person in Bloedel Hall and to those joining from home online. Others are offered online via Zoom only, and some are offered only in person.

THE RADIX PROJECT

Saint Mark's launched *The Radix Project: Small Groups/Deep Roots* in January 2020. It was conceived as an opportunity to gather in small groups of 8–12 participants with a threefold focus: reflecting together on Holy Scripture and sacred art, sharing personal stories, and praying for one another with intention. Every Radix series begins with an opening plenary presentation which introduces the theme.

Each group is guided by a facilitator and meets for 90 minutes, once a week for six weeks. Some groups meet in person, while others meet only online. Radix group members are both local and far-flung, and do not need to be otherwise connected to Saint Mark's to participate.

SACRED GROUND

Sacred Ground is an intense, small-group learning cohort which will meet over eleven sessions from October 2025 through June 2026. Seven sessions will be via zoom, with four in person at Saint Mark's. Capacity is limited. The series is built around a powerful online curriculum of documentary films and readings that focus on Indigenous, Black, Latino, and Asian/Pacific American histories as they intersect with European American histories. Sacred Ground is part of The Episcopal Church's long-term commitment to racial healing, reconciliation, and justice in our personal lives, our ministries, and our society. This series is open to all and especially designed to help white people talk with other white people openly and honestly about racial history and learning.

EDUCATION FOR MINISTRY (EfM)

Do you want to go deeper into your faith in an intentional, ongoing way? Do you want to form lasting connections with others who also seek that deepening of their spiritual life? Consider registering for *Education for Ministry* (EfM), the Episcopal Church's most in-depth adult Christian education course. Study the Bible, history, and theology, as well as connect faith and life experiences through theological

reflection. EfM is a program of The University of the South's School of Theology in Sewanee.

Admission requires a solid commitment to attend the weekly seminars and to spend between two and four hours in study and preparation weekly during the academic year (September–June). It is a four-year program, but students commit to one year at a time. Each class is limited to 12 people. EfM is also available online for students who are not able to attend the weekly seminars. Two different classes meet weekly, September to June, at Saint Mark's: Mondays, 10 a.m.–2:30 p.m., and Mondays, 6–8 p.m. Please inquire by contacting class mentors.

GODLY PLAY™

Saint Mark's has a significant history with Godly Play, long considered the gold standard of children's formation in The Episcopal Church. It is offered at 10:10 a.m. on the first and third Sundays of the month from September through June, except in November 2025 and April 2026, when it will meet on the second and third Sundays. The classes for children in preschool through second grade and for third through fifth grade students, meet on the mezzanine of the St. Nicholas Bldg. Used in 77 countries worldwide, this Montessori-based method recognizes that children are already in relationship with God. It invites them to wonder deeply about the core stories of scripture and imaginatively explore our liturgical traditions as it gives them practice in speaking the language of our Christian faith. Teachers receive specialized training and must pass a background check and complete Safe Church training.

THE THRESHOLD FUND

The Saint Mark's Cathedral Threshold Fund began as an initiative to help individuals and families experiencing housing insecurity by providing financial assistance with rental deposits and move-in costs, thereby lowering the financial barrier to safe, permanent housing. Since its launch in 2018, more than two hundred individuals and families have benefitted from Saint Mark's Threshold Fund. Qualified recipients typically receive first and last month's rent and security deposit— half as an outright gift, half as a loan to be repaid when they are able. Saint Mark's partners with Catholic Community Services (CCS) to administer the program, which includes case management to ensure those in need obtain the support services from which they will benefit. To date, more than \$100,000 has been provided through the Threshold Fund, all made possible by donations.
